They are epic myths of war, magic, love, betrayal, triumph, and ruin.

 $\underline{\textbf{Beowulf}}$ is an Old English story by an anonymous Anglo-Saxon poet. It is referred to as an EPIC poem. The poem tells a story of a strong and brave warrior (Beowulf) who defeats monsters and goes on to become King. Beowulf's first major battle was against Grendel, a monster that had been terrorising the Scyldings.
